EMPLOYMENT SERVICES FOR PEOPLE WITH MENTAL HEALTH DISABILITIES IN MASSACHUSETTS

This flyer describes employment services for people with mental health disabilities in Massachusetts. These are provided by One-Stop Career Centers.

One-Stop Career Centers

One-Stop Career Centers are public centers, operated by the Massachusetts Executive Office of Labor and Workforce Development, that provide a range of assistance to job seekers in one place.

The centers offer services including:

- tutoring, studying, skills training, and instruction leading to secondary school completion;
- alternative secondary school offerings;
- summer employment opportunities directly linked to academic and occupational learning;
- paid and unpaid work experiences, including internships and job shadowing;
- occupational skills training and training referrals;
- supportive services;
- adult mentoring for a duration of at least twelve months that may occur both during and after program participation;
- career counseling as well as other forms of counseling and referrals to counseling;
- vocational evaluation and assessment; and
- employment search.

Finding a Center

Information for people with disabilities

While some individuals with disabilities are able to access center services without any special assistance, some may bring someone with them to help access services. Additionally, individuals can contact their local center before visiting to learn if there are any special services available for people with disabilities. Some centers do have dedicated services.

The centers also collaborate with Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commission funded employment service providers so that is another source of support for people with disabilities.¹
